Driven Dressage Basics with Shelley Temple

Last month I "attended" a webinar sponsored by the American Driving Society featuring Shelley Temple. Shelley has competed at the Advanced Level in CDEs since 1997, is an ADS and USEF 'R' Judge in Combined Driving, and is an active competitor, instructor, trainer and clinician. I usually don't care much for webinar as a presentation method, but it was free, so I signed up.

At the appointed time, I logged onto my computer and turned up the volume. After I clicked on the webinar link, the screen came up and I could hear the ADS narrator doing an introduction and getting everything ready. There were over 200 people logged in! The narrator explained that there was a small pane on the right side of the screen where we could type questions to be answered during the discussion. So far, so good.

Ms Temple had prepared a large number of slides to illustrate her presentation, which she controlled from her location in Florida. She pointed out different things on the slides and flipped forward and back as fitted the discussion. I am now a fan of the webinar format, and will probably attend any others that the ADS sends out free—I like free the best of anything.

The content of the webinar was Driven Dressage Basics. Ms Temple talked about the different levels of the dressage training scale and what judges look for in each level. Judges use the training scale to evaluate your horse's training and to score your test to the requirements of each level. The first level, for example, is rhythm and relaxation. This forms the foundation for future levels of dressage training. Relaxation allows the horse to step in the natural rhythm of each gate. A

relaxed horse will work easily with his back, display regularity of strides in all gaits, and "track up" with his hind feet falling in or in front of the hoof prints of his front feet. Tempo is a key part of this step. Tempo is the rate of repetition of footfalls in a gait, whether fast or slow. Each horse has a tempo in which it can relax, balance and swing; depending upon its confirmation, level of training and strength. Regularity of strides means that a horse keeps the same tempo in all gates and transitions.

Ms Temple covered the other levels of dressage training scale with equal thoroughness, as well as how to read a dressage test, and how to interpret judge's comments and scoring. I recommend that any ADS member who is interested in dressage or combined driving sign up for the free webinars on the ADS website.


